The Importance of Career and Student Technical Organizations

I am very excited to start to participate in the Outstanding Teen Pageants through

the Miss America Pageant system. I plan to use this adventure into the world of pageants to advocate for Career and Technical Student organizations. I have chosen The Importance of Career and Student Technical Organizations as my platform. I want people to know Career and Student Technical organizations encourage students to stay in school and graduate. In fact, 94.8% of CTAE concentrators graduated from high school in 2015-16. That is a higher rate than all of Georgia students combined. Currently in high school, CTAE students earned 26,522 industry credentials and 27,512 students participated in post-secondary options to earn college credit. These numbers are increasing each year because of the efforts in Technical Education.

2017 marks the 100th year since the Smith-Hughes National Vocational Education Act of 1917. The United States Congress created this legislation that promoted the vocational agriculture to train people "who have entered upon or who are preparing to enter upon the work of the farm," and provided federal funds for this purpose. Many of our land grant universities were dedicated to the purpose of educating the public. Many pieces of legislation are proposed and supported over the years to promote Technical Education Enhancement like the Carl Perkins Career and Education Act. And yet our technical programs do battle every year for funding and support in many of our local schools. Teachers must do what they can to attract students to their programs. Many technical education programs are in danger every year as budgets are debated on the local level.

CTSO's have advocates at the state legislature that encourage CTAE programs by communicating with legislators, government leaders, chamber of commerce,

economic development professionals, and business and industry partners. As a state officer in a Career and technical Student Organization, FCCLA (Family, Career and Community Leaders of America), I have been working on promoting the benefits of CTSO membership.

I believe that It is important for students to know about these programs in our local schools and participate in CTSO's. Students learn skills for life through character development, creative and critical thinking and interpersonal communication, practical knowledge and career preparation. I believe that it is also important for funding to be in place to assist these programs in our local schools. Every student should be encouraged to participate in the activities offered through competitions, community service, and leadership training. I plan to use the pageant platform to advocate for CTSO's. I would encourage students to stay in school, finish their education and find their passion in CTAE.

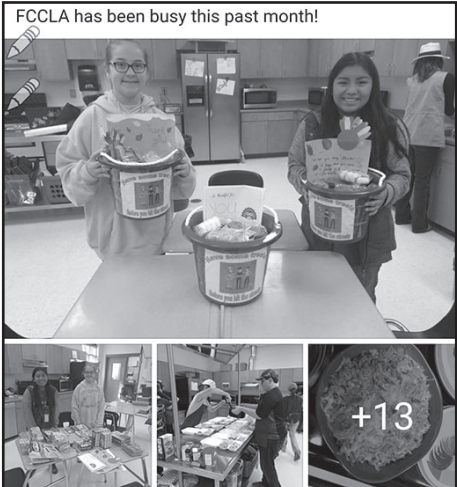

The 17-year-old Decatur High School (DHS) junior is his first year in the school's culinary arts program, and he's just now getting his hands in the kitchen.

"I really just happened this year that I realized I was above average at cooking," Forgy said. "I've always really liked it and I was good at it throughout the year, but then my sophomore year, I got into the kitchen and I realized I was really good at it."

"I don't like the taste of the kitchen that much, but when you're making a good meal, it's really satisfying."

Forgy has been working on food presentation in class, but he's been decorating plates in Decatur for three months while shadowing the sous chef at Revival—a farm-to-table restaurant focusing on Southern cuisine.

Revival is owned by Kevin Gillespie, who was featured in the sixth season of the reality television series Top Chef in 2009, where he finished as a runner-up.

The DHS culinary program has a relationship with Revival and Forgy was given his opportunity after shadowing his first night in early September.

"It was a lot," Forgy said of his first night at Revival, where the staff put him to work with a trainer and allowed him to prove himself.

After a few months, Forgy now says he's coming into his own in the Revival kitchen.

"It helps once you've been there for a while and you kinda have your own system to keep track of everything."

Of all the dishes he's prepared at Revival, Forgy said his favorite is a delicate squash salad.

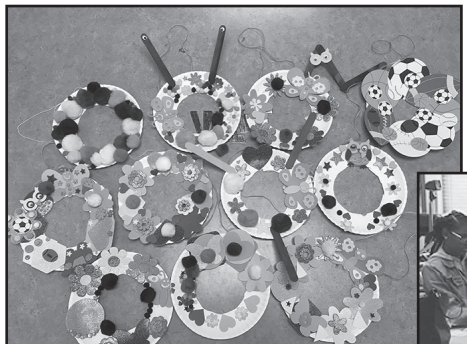

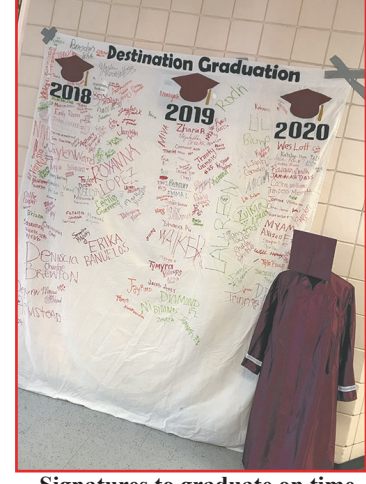

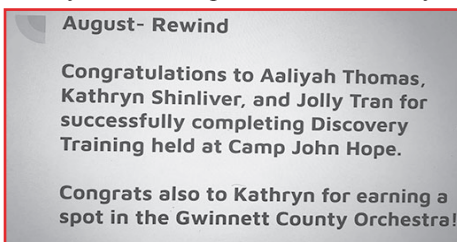

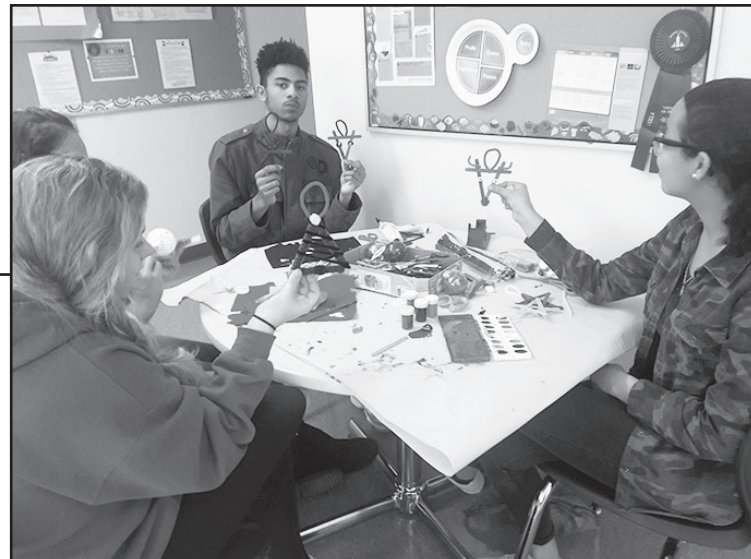

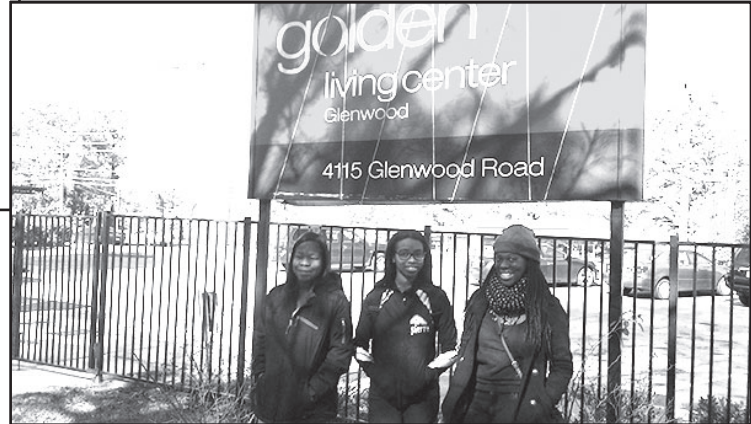

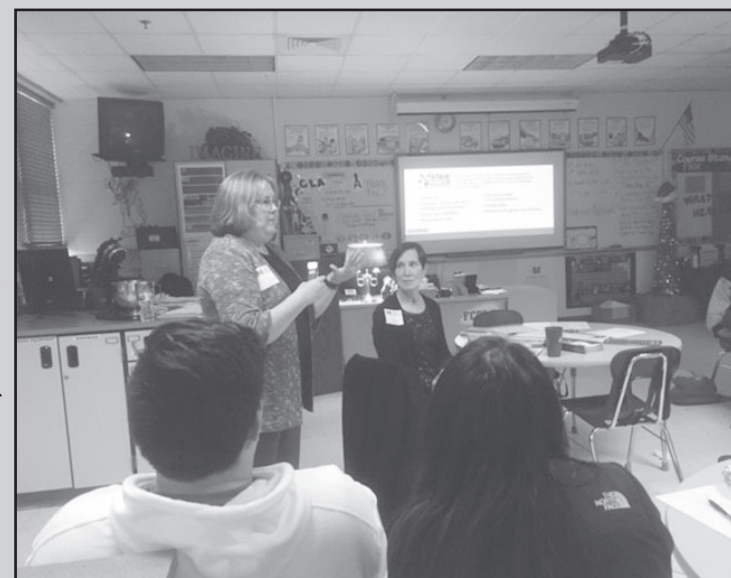
Marietta High School Learns about Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking
